Opening Sentences

On the last Sunday of January, as I was standing at the altar breathing in the beauty of the music Rick was wrapping up before the post-communion prayer, I had a sudden revelation. Thanks to you, there's yet another downside of clergy life that doesn't apply to me anymore! I can remember my seminary field education advisor telling me, many decades ago now, "Something you'll have to get used to as a priest is that you won't be able to actually worship yourself, as you are leading services. There's just too much to think about coordinating for everyone else, for you to get spiritually involved yourself."

But, it seems over the past ten years, that warning has completely slipped my mind, and I'm kind of taking my worship with you here at St. Luke's for granted! Yes, I'm still in the business of leading services; but, once I get started, I feel much more like I'm engaged with you in a spiritual sense than orchestrating something for your benefit. Now, maybe that has something to do with how long I've been at it, but I also feel there's something about St. Luke's that's different.

There are those who attend church looking to the clergy for inspiration leading them to God. But I have this sense you come here pre-inspired. I feel you're gathering to give thanks for God's abiding presence in your life, rather than making your weekly visit to God. You're not expecting perfection for your benefit, you're here to share your joy and prayers with everyone else. It's hard to explain, but I'll just say it comes naturally for me to bare my soul to God in worship with you at St. Luke's.

And, while I'm in a mood of gratitude, let me thank the Women of St. Luke's for the amazing Sunday dinners you've been sending Polly and me home with lately. You apparently began the new year on a mission of stress relief; and your plan has been working! On the practical side, these delicious meals have been easy to open up, heat up and enjoy – with a great lunch or two left over. But then, there's the spiritual dimension.

The sense of thanksgiving we drive home with now is hard to describe. Because, it's not just dinner, but love, we're carrying home with us in the back seat of our car. You've managed to say: "this is for you, thank you," and "we love you" all in one box or cooler. How many congregations are honestly able to say to their clergy as they leave church on Sunday morning: "Enjoy your day of rest!" Yes, you've managed to accomplish the impossible! But then, as the card we framed years ago hanging in our entrance hall reminds us: "With God, nothing is impossible."





The Wardens Report

First of all, thank you, thank you, and thank you for your continued support of St. Luke's! Thanks be to God! We were blessed with a wonderful Stewardship Season, thanks to Jan Williams, chair of the committee this year, and can report that we have a balanced budget to work with for 2023. I, (as well as others), know that it wasn't that long ago we needed to do a couple of fund raisers during the year to help financially get through the year. We are truly blessed to have Fr. Phil and all of you, our little flock. Our light at St. Luke's shines very bright!

Even though we didn't get to have our Christmas Eve service on December 24th, we were blessed on January 1st with an amazing service of Lessons and Carols. Thanks to Emily Slade for her beautiful solo and everyone else for their singing! The church was beautiful and it was a wonderful way to start the New Year. Great to have so many on Zoom joining in as well.



Since our last newsletter, the renovation of the restroom at church has taken place. Todd Stone, the contractor, did an amazing job of getting the old chimney out and repairing the roof, new green board dry wall, tile flooring, paint, new fixtures, and a new wider door. It is lovely and functioning well. We still have a few small details to finish, but wow it's wonderful. Todd will be back this year to repair the storm door on the parish. The wind finally got it and broke the frame but somehow never broke the glass.

Thanks to Gage Slade our Facebook page is getting a facelift. Big thanks to Nicole Landers for getting in up and running originally, but after leaving for the UK no one had worked on it. We are very thankful for the talents of the Slade family and deciding to call St. Luke's their new church home.

Our next big project will be the retaining wall along the creek on the South side of the church property. We're happy to say after a year of searching we have accepted a proposal for 75 feet of wall, removing one old tree and a couple of tree stumps, and bring the grade of that side of the lawn, back to level where it should be with the rest of the lawn. Eventually the wall will be topped with a wrought iron railing similar to the one up the sidewalk going into church. Our projected start time is, hopefully, April and could be finished with grass growing by Memorial weekend.

The shelter box project for the Southeast District raised \$11,000 in total and St. Luke's raised \$520 towards that. The funds will make a tremendous difference in emergency disaster relief. Thank you for your support and generosity!

In closing I would just like to say thank everyone for making Kathy Horton's Sunday so special. Who would have known the Gospel reading for last Sunday, when we picked the date, would be so perfect, along with the wonderful sermon from Fr. Phil. Later everyone out did themselves with that wonderful brunch. It was a true church family affair in every word!
